



## Saintales Theodore

April 26, 1937 - February 11, 2025

Saintales Theodore, affectionately known as “Tales,” passed away on February 11, 2025, at the age of 87. Born on April 26, 1937, in Haiti, he lived a life marked by love, strength, and resilience.

Saintales was preceded in death by his parents Thermonfils Theodore and

was his pride and joy, and he worked tirelessly to provide for them.  
He migrated from Haiti to the United States in 1982, where he continued his  
legacy of hard work and  
dedication. Whether as a farmer in Haiti or an industrial worker in the United  
States, he made sacrifices to  
ensure that his children were cared for and had the best opportunities in life.  
Tales was a man of strong principles and quiet strength, known for his firm but  
gentle nature, which was  
evident in the fact that he would not let his kids whistle in the presence of  
grown folks as he would often  
say “Timoun pa soufle sou granmoun”. His love for his children and his work  
ethic were evident in  
everything he did. He had a passion for life, and one of his greatest joys was

playing dominos. His infectious enthusiasm for the game brought laughter to all who played with him. When he won, you could always hear him say, “Mwen menm wi, ponyèt mwen bon” — and indeed, “ponyèt li te bon,” as he was often the one on the winning side. Even in his final moments, he recalled the joy of the game with the words “doub blan” and “doub sis”, dekabès-delòbèy as he reminisced about his love for dominos.

In the last few years of his life, Saintales found comfort in the Bible hope for the future and developed a new perspective on biblical truths. He was a regular attendee at the Memorial of Christ’s death, conventions, assemblies, and meetings at the local Kingdom Hall of Jehovah’s Witnesses. His final wish was for a Jehovah’s Witness to deliver his funeral talk, a testament to what really brought him peace and hope in his later years.

Tales will be remembered for his kindness, humor, and the immense love he showed to those closest to him. He touched the hearts of everyone who knew him. He will be deeply missed by his family and all who have the privilege of crossing paths with him.

May his memory live on in the hearts of his children, grandchildren, nephews and nieces and all who were blessed to know him. Saintales Theodore, a man strength, and love, has left behind a legacy that will endure forever.
